

GOING AGAINST THE GUIDELINES By Harold Feldheim

ntermediate players learn a lot of rules to help their judgment in both play and bidding. These guidelines are well known to all: eight ever nine never, cover an honor with an honor, lead from a long suit against no trump, and more. These are reasonable guidelines and will serve in most cases to supply reasonable structure to both play and defense. However, it is important to realize that these guides are in no way absolute and indeed, many opportunities are dependant on knowing when to break the rules. Quoting Charles Goren, "Broad rules of play are reasonably good guides. They will help an inexperienced to cope with players of greater skill. But rules were not meant to take the place of reasoning."

The following hand illustrates this principle. Most expert pairs would solve this problem at the table while most less experienced players would misdefend.

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Against this rather uninformative auction, West led the ♥9. **Rule #1** - Against NT, lead a long

suit, (4th best).

Note that West correctly distained leading either long suit. Leading clubs from such a poor holding would require partner to hold too much to be effective while, based on the auction, a spade seemed unappetizing.

Rule #2 - Third hand high. South played small from the dummy and East correctly declined to win the king, signaling with a high heart. The reason is 'in the cards.' To establish the hearts, the defense needed two entries and he only held one 'maybe-entry.' Therefore, West needed an entry. East correctly determined that declarer started with QJ10 and if he won the heart and returned a heart, West would not have a third heart to establish the suit.

Rule #3 - Second hand low.

South won the heart in hand and led a diamond. Hoping

East held the king, West rose with the ace (preserving partner's king) and returned his last heart. South played low from the dummy. East won



the king and cleared the suit. With only eight tricks in view, South had to either find West with the diamond king or finesse the club Jack. Based on the opening lead, South decided that West held club length and finessed the club Jack. While this was probably empirically correct, the result was going set two instead of one.

In any event, violating the guidelines resulted in a useful defensive plus score.

Moral: "No number of rules and regulations make up for creative thought."

HE KIBITZER -

The Kibitzer is published quarterly by the Connecticut Bridge Association, Unit 126 of the American Contract Bridge League.
